Dear Scouting Friends,

In 2020, Samoset Council exemplified true resilience as it faced the unprecedented national crisis of the COVID-19 pandemic. Plans were thrown into disarray and our staff and volunteer leadership were able to quickly put together plans to keep Scouting going!

Samoset led the way as being one of only a handful of councils across the country that provided summer camp programs. Our staff led the way in putting together a “cohort” (small group) model that was recognized nationally as a best practice in safely holding summer camp programs. Along with social distancing, wearing masks, frequent hand washing, and sanitation procedures, we were able to deliver a camping program to over 3,600 youth at our properties.

While the pandemic caused local communities and units to shelter in place and cancel in-person meetings, Samoset council utilized technology to keep Scouting going. Online meeting platforms provided the unique ability to deliver program and training opportunities through virtual merit badge clinics, virtual campfires, live stream Scouting Events, and more for our youth who were at home.

We are proud to have celebrated Samoset Council’s 100th Anniversary (Founded on July 30, 1920) of providing Scouting’s programs to youth in North Central Wisconsin. Even our Governor Tony Evers issued a Certificate of Commendation for the work that Scouting is doing throughout the thirteen counties that we serve.

We invite you to review our 2020 Annual Report to see how Samoset Council is making a meaningful impact in the lives of young people in our communities.

On behalf of our Board of Directors and our volunteers and youth members we serve, we “Thank you” for your investment in our Scouting programs. Your involvement provides our local community with future leaders, informed citizens, and provides young people with the tools they need to overcome life’s challenges.



This family program serves boys and girls ages 5 – 10 developing self-esteem, teaching cooperation, values, and unity.

SCOUTS BSA 987 YOUTH

This outdoor program serves young men and women ages 11 – 18 focusing on leadership and character development while instilling the value of service to others.

VENTURING 19 YOUTH

A program for young men and women ages 14 – 20 that uses high adventure to provide positive experiences that help youth mature and become responsible adults.

EXPLORING 62 YOUTH

A worksite-based program for young men and women ages 14 - 20 that exposes youth to community organizations and careers.

STEM 236 YOUTH

Serves boys and girls ages 8 – 18 through an afterschool program that uses hands on labs to help youth learn about science, technology, engineering, and math.

Outreach Programs

- Over \$90,000 in financial aid and scholarships were provided to positively impact all youth and families in our council.
- Served 11 outreach units throughout North Central Wisconsin, providing assistance to ensure that every youth and adult who wanted to participate in Scouting could do so for free regardless of their financial, economic, or geographic status.
- We partner with community-based organizations: Spencer Kids Group, Boys and Girls Clubs, Community Connection, and others to serve local youth.
- Provided over 150 outreach youth with an outdoor adventure experience at our camps.

Camping & Facilities 3,600 CAMPERs

Crystal Lake Scout Reservation

An 1,100-acre property consisting of three program camps located near Rhinelander, WI.

- Tesomas Scout Camp – Traditional weeklong summer-camp experiences for Scouts BSA youth.
- Akela's World Cub Scout Camp – Offering camp programs for Cub Scout aged youth.
- Hanna Venture Base – Offering a variety of High Adventure programs for older youth .

Camp Phillips

A 78-acre property in Weston, WI used for short-term camping and training activities.

Flambeau Canoe Base

Located west of Phillips, WI on the south fork of the Flambeau River providing biking and hiking trails, campsites, and canoes for rent.

Wausau Homes Scout Service Center

Located next to Camp Phillips in Weston, WI our council service center is our administrative hub (membership, finance, field service, program, and customer service) that serves the entire council and houses our Scout Shop that provides advancement, recognition, and outdoor camping items for sale.
